ccording to our records, you are celebrating a birthday in your family this month! As you celebrate your child's birth, we want to provide this booklet to help you as you guide your child on a spiritual journey to know, love and follow Jesus. This year's focus is: FAMILY TIME.

At Eastview, we believe that God designed the home to be the primary place for discipleship in a child's life. It is our privilege to come alongside you as you raise your child in the ways of the Lord. We offer this Family Ministry Map as a guide to help you raise your child one step at a time — with one annual focus each year. This certainly isn't the only parenting plan you could follow, but over the 18 years of your child's life, you will have followed a fairly comprehensive plan to raise your child in the faith.

These booklets are not intended to cover all there is to know about each topic. Sometimes parents feel overwhelmed with the responsibility of raising their child to know the Lord, and aren't sure where to start. So we have created simple steps to get you started. ach year throughout the parenting plan, take time to write your child a letter. Below are some ideas of things to include that will speak life and love into your child, as well as give them an invaluable collection of insights into their upbringing and a storyline of memories to be cherished for the rest of their lives. You can write them all in a journal or write each letter as a separate piece of paper.

Include a photo of your family with the letter to give a year by year collection of memories all in one place.

Each year after giving your child the letter, get it back and keep them all somewhere safe.

You will give them all to your child in the 18th year for LAUNCH.

FOURTH BIRTHDAY: FAMILY TIME

hen your child reaches about four years old, it is a great time to establish a pattern of including fun family times in your schedule to foster communication, laughter and faith formation. We want to challenge you to take this year to establish an intentional Family Time in your family's rhythm.

While it shouldn't replace the unscheduled, everyday type of teaching reflected in our 3rd Birthday booklet, it is important to have a consistent routine of creating intentional moments that will help your family deepen relationships and have faith discussions. Regularly scheduled family time activities are a great way to make that happen.

PICK YOUR TIME: For some families this might be a particular night of the week after dinner. For another family it might be after Saturday morning breakfast. Decide what works for your unique schedule and then protect that time. You might need to say "no" to some good things to make family times a priority. We suggest scheduling a family time experience weekly, but no less than twice per month. Setting and keeping a regular schedule will show commitment and value to all involved. This booklet will help you with ideas on what you can do to make the most of this time.

PLAN WHAT YOU'LL TEACH: As you plan this time, find resources to help make your family times a great experience. We have listed several recommended resources in this booklet to help you get started. Keeping your preparation simple is a very good idea until you get into the rhythm of these family times. Don't forget that the Bible is the most important resource God has given us to instill truth in the hearts and minds of our children, and can easily be the only resource you use for your time.

MAKE IT FUN: Children are more likely to embrace your beliefs and values if they enjoy time with you. That's why family fun times are a great context for effective faith formation. Start the time out with something fun for your family like a favorite treat or a game everyone likes. Keep things loose and informal. Avoid becoming overly serious, rigid or stressed while leading family times. It's okay for kids to be silly and it's important to fill your home with laughter. The first few times, everybody might end up in time out, including Dad! But don't get discouraged and frustrated. With some effort and commitment, this could be a tradition that becomes so cherished that it lasts in your family well into your children's adulthood.

GETTING STARTED: Protect a day and time and let your child place a sticker on the family calendar to help build anticipation. Choose a family theme song that you can crank on the stereo to gather everyone together each time. Spend a little time singing, silly dancing, swinging the kids, etc. to get everyone in the mood for the best part of the week! If you have older kids, let them help pick the songs, games, etc. Use one of the ideas in this packet as a family lesson time to teach a spiritual truth to them. Remember this rule of thumb throughout their life when preparing for Family Night. They will have about one minute of attention span for each year of their life (so plan four minutes for a four year old). Keep your lessons simple, but if you have older kids, it's okay if your four year old hears his siblings talking through faith issues, even if they don't understand it all.

IDEAS FOR FUN INTENTIONAL TIMES:

Choose a family verse that you want to be an identifying mark for your family. Pick a prominent place in the house and put the verse up for everyone to see often. You could paint the verse on the wall, print it out and put it on the fridge, or many verses can be purchased as a decoration at stores like Hobby Lobby.

- Turn Movie Night into Family Night. Make some popcorn and watch the film together. Afterwards have a "faith talk" about the choices of characters and other aspects of the story that catch your attention. Check out movienightchat. com for some suggested movies.
- Share with your child something that God has been or is teaching you. Be real and vulnerable.
- Cook a meal together each week and use the time for sharing and talking.
- Daily Family Time: ask each member of the family to share his or her "high" and "low" of the day at dinner or bedtime.
- Create a graffiti wall in your home where everyone can write scripture verses, sketches and quotes that are special to them. This might become the most treasured decoration in the home.











FAMILY NIGHT IDEAS

ometimes the hardest part about having a family time is not doing it, but coming up with what you will do for it. While you can get as creative as you want, it doesn't take a lot of prep to have a meaningful and memorable time together. Some weeks might be simple and others might be a real memory-maker! The following resources can help take the stress out of that part of spending faith-building time as a family.

EASTVIEW KIDS FAMILY NIGHT IDEAS: Each week, the Eastview Kids staff offer a family activity that goes along with the lesson that the kids cover on Sundays. These are available in the Family Ministry Newsletter, which comes right to your inbox. Sign up to receive it at eastview.church/eastviewfamilynews.

SUNDAY POST GAME: Right after church, while everything is fresh on everyone's mind, have a family discussion over lunch or dinner about what everyone learned at church. This helps your kids process what they've learned and keeps you involved as their parent in what they are learning at church.

FAMILY NIGHTS TOOL CHEST by Jim Weidmann and Kurt Bruner: There are several books under this series that cover things like Basic Christian Beliefs and Holidays.

FAMILY TIME ACTIVITIES by Kurt Weaver: Learn about the danger of anger, what's special about a peanut, and what the Bible says about forgiveness and "disappearing sins." This book also includes a great lesson on teaching kids how to pray.

Christianmomthoughts.com/25-family-devotional-timeideas: This free online resource has various family night ideas.

STAIRWAY CHALLENGE: Gather all of your kids at the bottom of the steps. Stand at the top and give them this challenge. Tell them they need to get to you at the top of the stairs without touching the stairs (or the handrails if you have them). If they can, you will take them out for ice cream cones. They, of course, will not be able to do it. So, one at a time, go down and pick them up and carry them up to you. Talk about how you represent God in heaven and that there is no way that we can get to heaven on our own. Just like you came down from the top of the stairs to take the kids to the top, Jesus came down to die for our sins so that we can go to heaven someday. (see a sample of this on RightNow Media) Take a moment to read John 3:16, pray together, thank God for our savior Jesus, and then go get that ice cream anyway!

BUBBLES, BALLOONS, & CHOCOLATE FAMILY TIME ACTIVITIES FOR PRESCHOOLERS by Kirk Weaver: Twenty lessons for your preschool age children.

<u>52 CREATIVE FAMILY TIME EXPERIENCES</u> by Timothy Smith: This book is for families with preschoolers to teens and gives ideas for your family night all year.

COVERTOPS: Get the family all dressed in dark clothes. Maybe even throw on some black face paint. Have fun with this part. Prepare a box of goodies/supplies for a family in need. Wait until it gets dark. Sneak over to their house and knock on the door and run! Hide down the street and try to watch the family find the unexpected blessing.

You should tie a helium balloon to the box in case they only look out the door and don't look down to see the box you left. You can get several nights from this one idea, changing it slightly to notes of encouragement or flowers for someone who needs to be cheered up; an already prepped dinner for someone in your small group who's really busy; a donation for someone's mission trip, etc.

End the night by reading Matthew 6:1-4 together while having a fun snack in your get-away vehicle.

THIS YEAR'S MARRIAGE PLAN

ach year we want to encourage you to make a plan to keep your marriage healthy. One of the most important gifts you'll give to your child is the love you give to your spouse. When mom and dad love each other and demonstrate the traits of a healthy (NOT PERFECT!) marriage, it not only sets a good example of a godly marriage, but gives them a greater sense of security and well-being. Andy Stanley in The Principle of the Path writes "We don't drift to good places." (Thomas Nelson, 2008). Good marriages require intentionality. Use the plan below to make an intentional effort in your marriage this year. Read The Best Us by Ted Lowe (©MarriedPeople 2016) for a full explanation of Have Serious Fun! Love God First; Respect and Love; Practice Your Promise.

Have Serious Fun! Date Night Scheduling: Grab your calendars and mark at least TWO date nights for each month and PROTECT those dates. Remember that you were boyfriend and girlfriend before you were dad and mom, and have fun together! No family administration discussions! For extra fun, watch for sponsored "Date Nights" by Eastview's Marriage Ministry. Each date night, you swing by the church to receive your plans for the evening.

Love God First - Faith Practices 101: Research finds that couples who pray together at least twice a week have a divorce rate of less than 1% (HomePointe). Commit to praying as a couple at least twice a week. Plan which worship service the two of you will attend together each week – don't "divide and conquer" in order to volunteer.

Love and Respect - Write an Annual Letter: Write a letter to your spouse for your anniversary this year, much like the one in this packet that you will write to your child. Write a letter of memories from this past year, affirmations, prayers and promises to each other.

Practice Your Promise - Personal Growth: Set a "secret goal" to grow as a spouse, such as "listening better," "praising her in public," or "initiating romance." Write it down and seal it in an envelope or save it on your phone. When you receive next year's packet, open the envelope or file and assess your progress.

Invest in Your Marriage: Join an email blog like lesandleslie.com, choose one book to read this year, or choose a small group study on marriage. The Eastview Family Resource Center, Eastview Marriage Ministry and RightNow Media have many helpful events and resources.


